February 1994

Dear ABANA Chapters,

The latest issue of the *Anvil's Ring* features a list of folks who have helped ABANA be the strong organization it is. Several of the ABANA Board's committees would be less effective without their help, it is very much appreciated. These people have gone out of their way to provide us with special help in their areas of expertise; however, they are not the only people helping ABANA and blacksmithing today. All of you who are working to make your Chapter strong, and spreading the word about our craft in general are helping in ABANA's efforts as well! Together, we are bringing blacksmithing into the mainstream.

Those of you who had the good fortune to go the *National Ornamental Metal Museum* in Memphis, Tennessee last month saw the first ABANA Member exhibition -- **The Blacksmithing Craft Continuum**. The show, which went from December 14 through January 30, featured the work of selected smiths, and also the work of those smiths that inspired them! The show was quite a success, and it was due in part to all the generous donations by chapters, smiths, and businesses determined to help make it happen. You will see an excellent spread on the exhibition in the next issue of the *Anvil's Ring*. True to our word, we are trying to support another exhibition for 1994!

The time remaining before the June, 1994 ABANA Conference is growing shorter! In Chapters all over the country, plans are under way to provide a ring for the conference Ring Project. The deadline to have the rings submitted for a promotion in the *Anvil's Ring* is March 1. I can hardly wait to see the finished product! Others among you are busy making items for the Conference Auction or Iron In The Hat. I have heard that this conference may shatter all ABANA Conference attendance records! In many ways, this 1994 ABANA Conference may just be the best one ever. The registration packets will be sent out in the spring, make sure you get your registration in early in order to get the best deal!

At your next club meeting, why don't you make it a point to point out to the crowd where your fire extinguishers are, and how to use them? Through no fault of their own, there are many people who have no idea how to use a fire extinguisher. That is no crime. But it would be a shame if something happened and you had a shop full of people who had no idea what your fire protection plans were. Fires have a way of going "out of control" rather quickly! These kinds of situations leave little time for crash courses in proper fire extinguisher use. Make sure that everyone knows how to use your fire extinguishers before your meeting really starts; and just as important, that they should aim the stream at the BASE of the fire, not into the flames! Outside, make sure people park away from the building, or at least leave plenty of room for firetrucks or other emergency vehicles. Just a little bit of planning can turn potential disaster into a mere pause in the program!

**FLORIDA ARTIST BLACKSMITH ASSOCIATION
BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING-FEBRUARY 5, 1994**

The board of trustees held its quarterly meeting during the lunch break at the northeast region meeting at J.C. and Eleanor Hawkin's Horseshoe Acres Forge in Morriston, Florida. Trustees present: **Tico Rubio**, President; **J.C. Hawkins**, Vice-President; **Patty Draper**, Secretary-Treasurer; **Carl Austin**, Trustee; **Steve Bloom**, Program Chair; **Ray Roberts**, Trustee and **Dale Kipp**, Trustee. Absent: **Ralph Kretzer**, Newsletter Editor; **Clyde Payton**, Trustee; and **Pat Imbinbo**, Trustee.

NEW FABA LOGO: The board unanimously approved development of a new logo. Members may submit suggested designs, with the new logo to be chosen by the full membership. A committee consisting of Walt Anderson, Chair; Jerry Grice and Carl Austin will set the ground rules and select the top three designs, which will then be submitted to the membership for a vote to be tallied by May 1, 1994. The winner will receive a free one-year membership.

SCHOLARSHIP TO JOHN C. CAMPBELL FOLK SCHOOL: The folk school has donated a one-week tuition scholarship for a FABA member. The board unanimously approved awarding the one-week tuition scholarship via a lottery.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR DEMONSTRATORS AT STATEWIDE MEETINGS: The board unanimously approved allocating up to \$500 per region to bring in demonstrators to statewide meetings for 1994. Thus, for the remainder of 1994, \$1000 is available to the Southwest and Northwest regions to bring in demonstrators for the quarterly statewide meetings in their areas. Funds were not allocated for the Northeast region because the State Conference at Barberville will provide plenty of demonstrators; none was allocated for the Southeast region because the statewide meeting just occurred in that region in January. Funds for 1995 statewide meetings will be addressed by the board at its meeting in Barberville in October.

COAL, COAL, COAL: The Horse's Hoof has relocated and will not be able to supply our coal at Barberville as it has in the past. Therefore the board indicated tentative approval for purchasing the coal outright from a mine, transporting it to Barberville, and supplying it to members there. Tico Rubio will check into the cost of coal and transportation and report back to the board with suggested action.

LIABILITY INSURANCE: Tico Rubio suggested that our safety procedures for demonstrations need to be reviewed and possibly revised and that the organization may wish to obtain insurance to cover specific events to protect demonstrators and the board against liability in case of accident, and to cover any injuries which an observer may suffer. It was also suggested that the legislature recently acted to relieve not-for-profit board members from liability. Patty Draper will check into this and report back to the board.

FAMILY PROGRAM AT STATE CONFERENCE IN BARBERVILLE: The board discussed the reimbursement, remuneration for family program faculty. Steve Bloom reported that the planning committee for the conference is reviewing these subjects and at this time plans to reimburse the faculty on a standard per diem, exact milage basis. No action was taken by the board.

ABANA NATIONAL CONFERENCE HOSTED BY FABAF: ABANA has inquired about the possibility of our chapter hosing the National ABANA Conference in Florida

sometime in the future. The Board voted to appoint a committee to explore the feasibility: Tycee Grice, Chair, Walt Anderson and Maggie Rubio. (Note: Maggie Rubio has since declined appointment due to other commitments).

ANVIL TO BE RAFFLED OFF AT BARBERVILLE: Raffles have been popular and effective fundraisers for our organization. The board unanimously approved raffling off a 125-150 lb. anvil at the State Conference. Tico Rubio will look into purchasing an anvil to be raffled.

BANK CHECKING ACCOUNT: The board unanimously approved opening a checking account at the City National Bank of Tallahassee, where our new treasurer is located. Under the FABA articles of incorporation, the president must sign all checks, plus a second signature must be obtained. The board authorized Patty Draper, Secretary-Treasurer or Bill Robertson (Program Coordinator, NW region) to sign in addition to Tico Rubio, President. The board also unanimously approved changing the registered agent for the organization to the secretary-treasurer.

BYLAWS REVIEW: The board unanimously approved a review of the chapter's articles of incorporation and bylaws. A committee was appointed to study the matter and make a recommendation to the board: Ray Roberts, Clyde Payton and Pete Brandenburg were appointed.

MORE ON THE STATE CONFERENCE: Steve Bloom announced that Jim Batson, Elizabeth Brim and Judd Nelson have agreed to demonstrate at the conference.

HISTORIC WHEELS: Walt Anderson reported that a unique opportunity has arisen for our organization to help obtain wheels from a very old logging cart. The cost is \$300. The Barberville Pioneer Settlement has already agreed to pick up half of the cost. The board unanimously approved spending \$150 to purchase the wheels.

FREE SCHOLARSHIP TO BLACKSMITHING SCHOOL

FABA President Tico Rubio is pleased to announce that the **John C. Campbell Folk School** is making available a **one-week tuition scholarship to a lucky FABA member**. The scholarship may be used during the calendar year of 1994 and is on a "space available" basis. Material costs, housing and meals are not included in the scholarship.

This is a fantastic opportunity for either a beginning or an advanced smith. Located in Brasstown, NC, the John C. Campbell Folk School grounds are idyllic; its blacksmith shop is well-equipped and spacious. A beginning smith will learn more in a one-week intensive class at the folk school than in a year on his or her own. Room and board runs about \$200 for 6 nights or camping with hot showers goes for \$48 (two persons per space).

The FABA Board of Trustees has decided to award this scholarship on a lottery basis with the winner's name to be drawn at the April Statewide meeting in Tallahassee (April 9, 1994 at Clyde and Vi Payton's shop). Each member is eligible to enter one time and you need not be present at the drawing to win. REPORT FROM THE JANUARY 15, 1994, STATEWIDE MEETING
IN FORT LAUDERDALE

FABA President Tico Rubio called the quarterly Board meeting to order at 1:15PM on Saturday, January 15, in Fort Lauderdale at Bo Davis' and Sharon Blondet's shop. Board members present were Tico Rubio, Dale Kipp, and Ray Roberts; they did not constitute a quorum, so no formal business was conducted. A special Board meeting will take place on February 6, 1994, at J. C. Hawkins' shop in Morriston. All members are welcome.

Tico announced that FABA has \$13,250.63, and the financial records are being transferred to the new Secretary/Treasurer, Patty Draper.

Vicki Lester moved her blacksmithing and farrier supply business, The Horse's Hoof, to Kentucky, so coal is no longer available through her. Tico is investigating the possibility of FABA buying coal in bulk for resale to members; details will follow.

Program Chairperson Steve Bloom has lined up knifemaker Jim Batson and artist/blacksmith Elizabeth Brim to demonstrate at the state conference in October. He's working on getting one more major demonstrator, and is looking into scheduling major out-of-state demonstrators for each region to boost regional interest in FABA. Remember to start working on your donation to the conference auction; the auction income helps keep the conference fees low. At the next meeting the Board will discuss purchasing a major item, such as an anvil, to be raffled off at the conference.

All 27 southeastern regional members present at the meeting voted to recommend to the Board that a new FABA logo be chosen. The present logo's complexity makes it difficult to reproduce. The members want all-cotton t-shirts and golf shirts with FABA's logo.

Tico passed out steel discs to be decorated for the gate at the Pioneer Settlement for the Creative Arts in Barberville. Pete Brandenburg will be in charge of collecting the finished discs from the southeastern members and getting them back to Tico.

Pete Brandenburg, ABANA's new Board member and treasurer, announced the upcoming ABANA conference to be held June 14-18 in St. Louis. Pete also explained that the ABANA members will vote at the conference to clean up the wording of the ABANA bylaws to confirm that all ABANA memberships are family memberships.

Tico appointed Pete to look into the possibility of obtaining liability insurance to cover those attending FABA events. Pete will prepare a report for FABA as soon as possible.

Tico closed the meeting by thanking Sharon Blondet and Bo Davis for hosting the state-wide meeting, and Mary Brandenburg and Anne Reynolds for providing lunch.

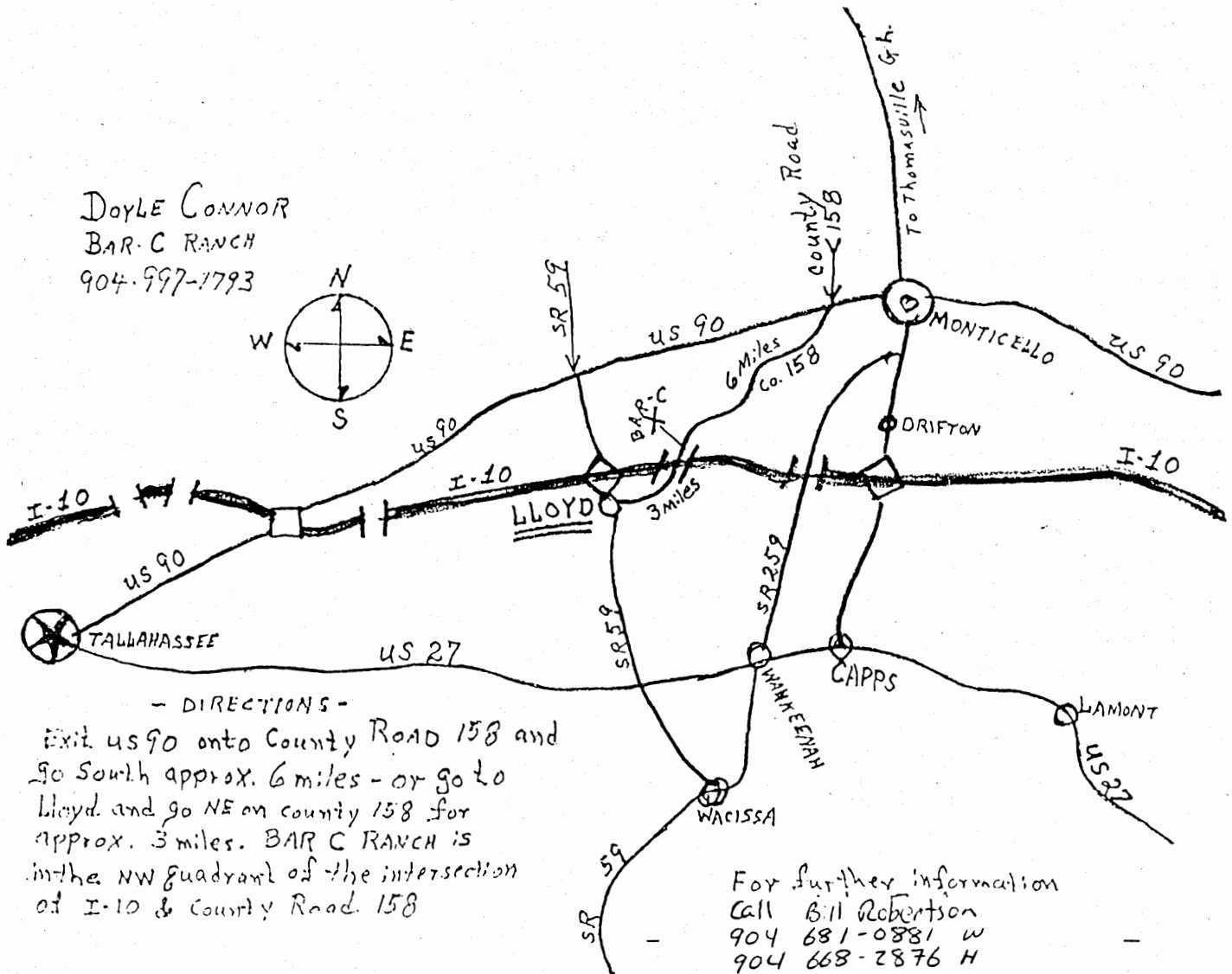
NEWS FROM THE NORTHWEST - MARCH

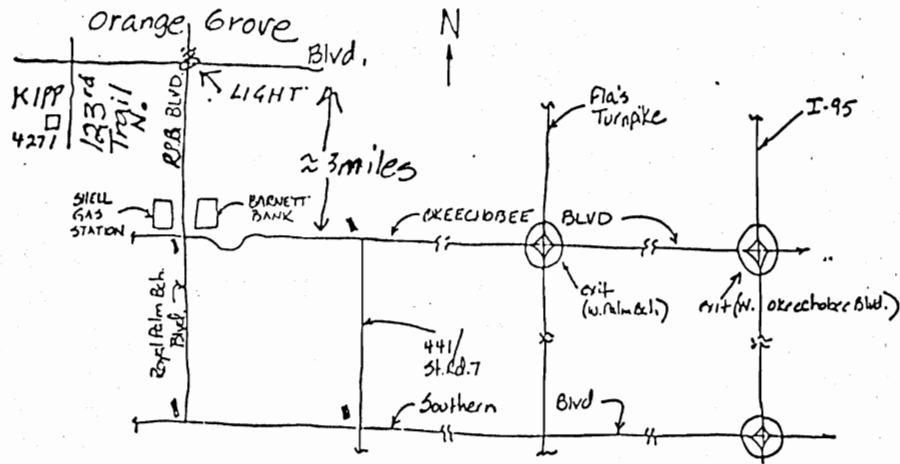

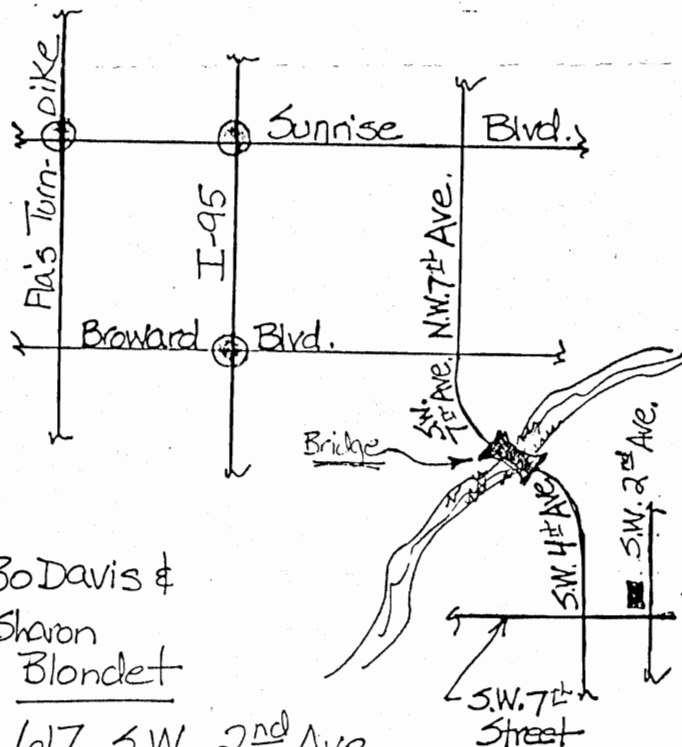
Doyle said he was going to stew something up to feed everyone, you can bring your cold drinks if you wish.

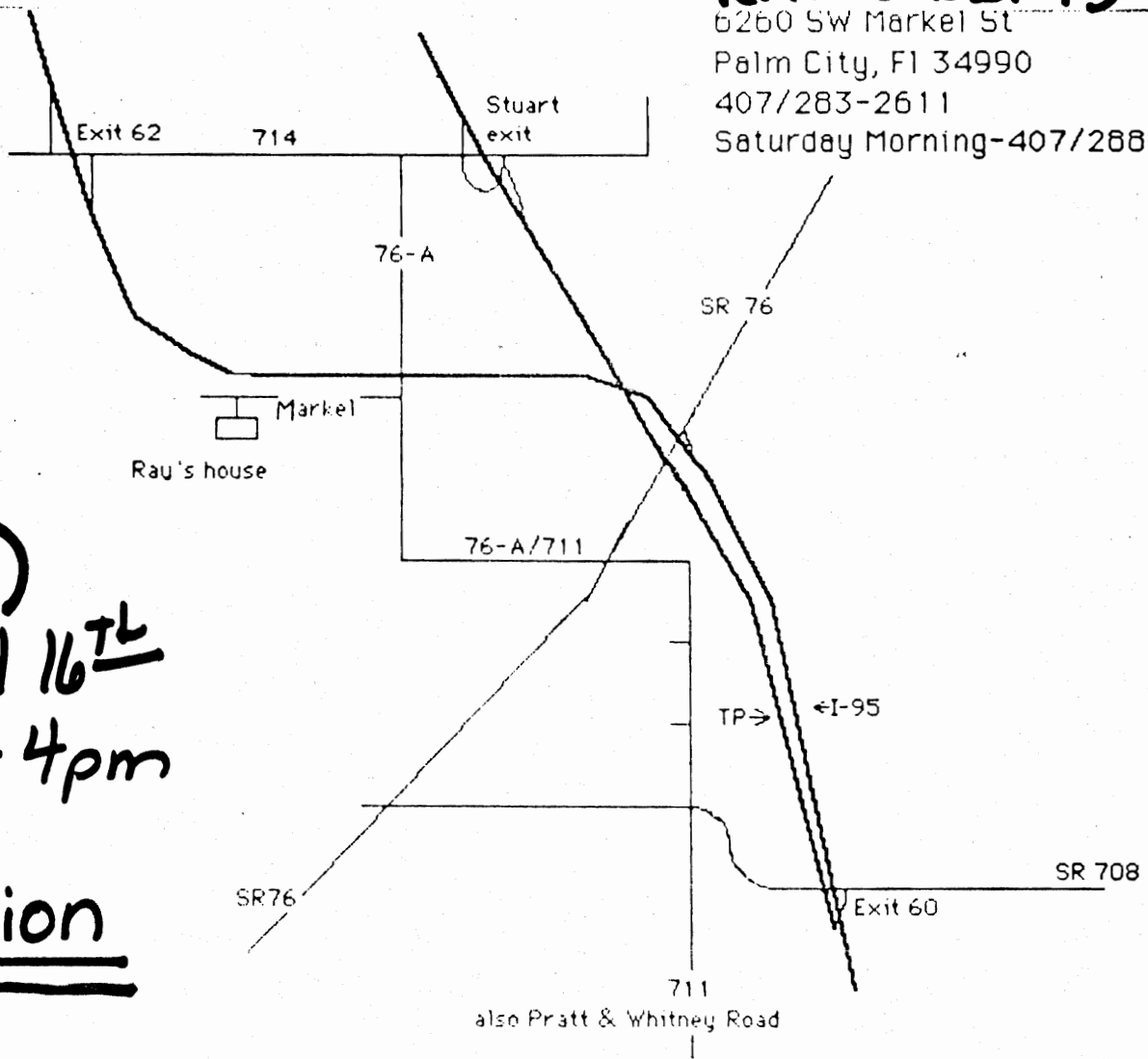

From North or South:

Take Turnpike to Stuart Exit (133); Turn left out of the exit at the light (Hwy 714). Go one mile to the first paved left (76-A), now three miles to Market St. (Note: Market St. will be on your right about 500 yards after going over the I-95 overpass. Look for balloons.) Market is a dirt road and I live about one and one fourth miles on the left side. (More balloons)

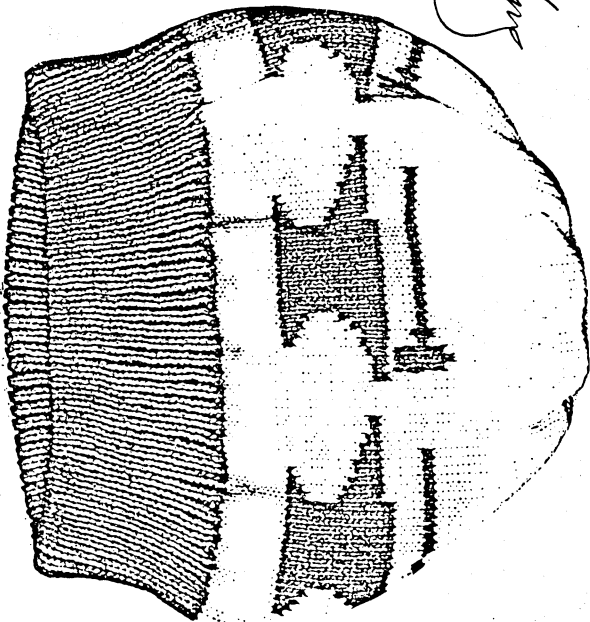

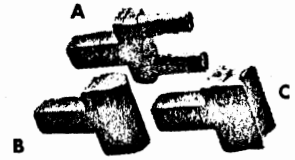

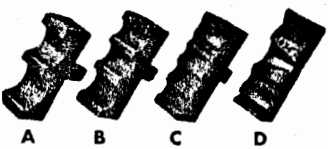
