



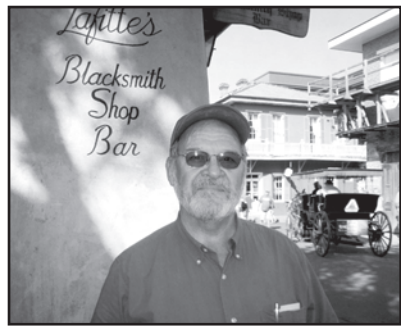

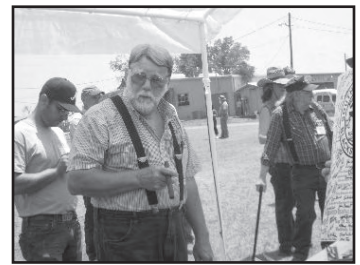

Tragedy strikes in FARMINGTON, MO at U.S. Championship Anvil shooting competition

- An anvil shooting’s danger really hit home June 4th when Tim Ryan from North Carolina lit a fuse with a cigar and the powder exploded prematurely. Ryan was standing only a foot or two away from the blast. The explosion blew off his thumb. His clothes caught fire. Fortunately, the anvil landed safely on the outfield grass. A few minutes later, a helicopter landed on the baseball field. Ryan was airlifted to Barnes Hospital in St. Louis. Jud R. Nelson (99) passed away June 6th at the Gordon Health Care Center. Jud was a long-time resident of Gordon County GA, living in Sugar Valley for 75 years. In 1970 he was a founding member of ABANA, the Artists and Blacksmiths Association of North America and hosted several of their meetings at his Sugar Valley home.

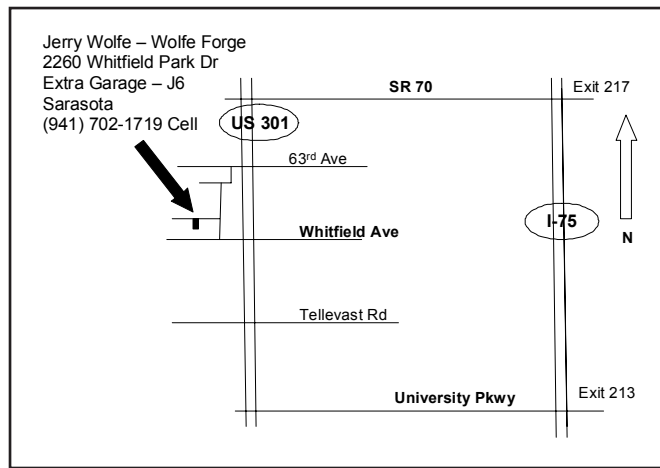
SE Meetings will be held on the third Saturday of the month at the Boy Scout camp at Tanah Keeta in Jupiter, Fl unless otherwise noted.

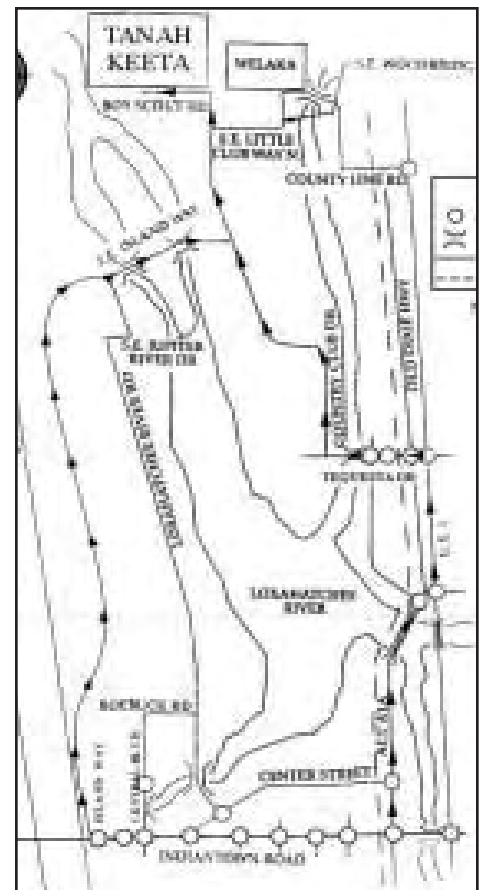

IN MEMORIAM

Again we are deeply saddened by the death of yet another beloved Blacksmith Brother – (last month it was J. L. Thompson).

Jud Nelson of Sugar Valley Georgia passed away on Tuesday, June 6, 2011. He would have been 100 years old on June 23, 2011!
His Masonic internment was Thursday, June 9, 2011 in Calhoun, Georgia.

Regardless of where you want to start in the long life of Jud Nelson, you will face a most impressive point of beginning. But, an humble – yet necessarily an abridged attempt - follows.

Jud began a full time apprentice as a blacksmith when he was fourteen years old and smithed until he was in his late 80's! Jud worked all over the United States as a smith. During W.W. II he worked in the navy shipyards of Jacksonville, Florida. His work can be seen in many places, in particular in Washington D.C. In his later years he operated his own shop in Sugar Valley, Georgia where he did traditional and farm blacksmithing for a broad area of north west Georgia. Jud was one of the principal “kick starters” of ABANA as well as many of the state and regional blacksmith associations.

Jud was inducted into the Brotherhood of Working Farriers Assoc. in 2004. He is featured in “The Foxfire” Book Number 9 (1992) with a chapter on building a horse-drawn wagon. This wagon is on display at the Foxfire Museum along with many iron accoutrements made in Jud's blacksmith shop.

Mastersmith Nelson was in constant demand by all blacksmithing groups – he demonstrated at many of the ABANA conferences. I still have a scovel hoe which Jud “resteeled” for me at the ABANA conference in Ripley, West Virginia.

In July of 1986 Jud, J. L. Thompson, Joe Neely, and the President of ABANA, Stan Strickland demonstrated at a hammer-in at PAYTON FORGE. (See the July 1986 issue of the CLINKER BREAKER).

Also on September 25, 26, 27, 1987 Jud was the principal demonstrator at FABA's very first statewide annual conference (see the September 1987 issue of the CLINKER BREAKER). This conference was held in the parking lot of the Capitol Inn Motel in Tallahassee, Florida. – What a line-up of demonstrators: Jud Nelson, Nol Putnam, Jim Batson, Jerry Grice, John Dittmeier, and Charles Ochs gave non-stop demonstrations for three days!

REGIONAL REPORTS

Northeast Report by Butch Patterson

It was a typical warm Florida day at the Pioneer Art Settlement in Barberville. On the drive there, Emily & I noticed an abundance of yard sales, a real sign that summer is here.

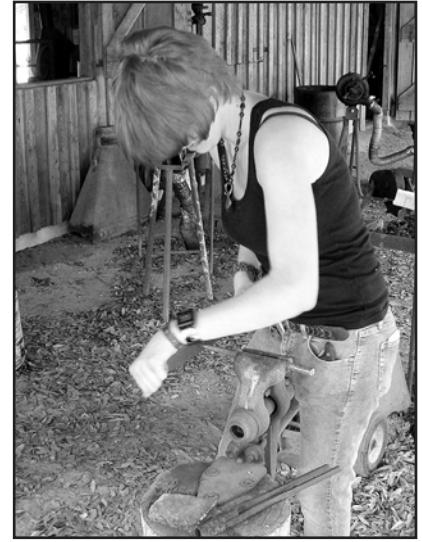
The demonstrator was Jim Robarr and he wowed the crowd with his knowledge. Jim gave us a well prepared presentation on how to make dies utilizing a die grinder and a few common workshop tools. His die was of a small mouse with some very nice detail. He showed us how to forge the metal into a point prior to using the die. Jim made it look easy to forge a mouse key ring.

Jim drew a number of questions that lead to some in-depth discussions.

He also brought along an interesting gas forge that uses a single fire brick. This little forge is inexpensive and easy to fabricate. Jim calls it the “One Brick Gas Forge”. One of Jim's suggestions is to substitute two 1” thick bricks for the single 2” thick brick as the two thinner bricks will heat up faster and a broken brick is easier to replace. Due to the change to two bricks, I decided to re-name the forge the “Two Brick One Brick Gas Forge”. No, I did not consult Jim about my new name, but he will know when he reads this!

Many thanks to Jim Robarr for an informative demonstration!

We had four members working at the open forges. Josh Mahn was forged a letter opener and his sister Morgan made a nice door latch. Heather Hole joined FABA in January and she forged a punch. All three were working without a lot of assistance and I see they have talent. As a result of one of the in-depth discussions that I mentioned above, Steve Estenson tried to make a Claydon joinery, it did not take him long to perfect it.



After the Iron in the Hat, Robert (Bob) Brown served up some scrumptious chicken from his smoker. Don't tell anyone but I think Bob's secret is the oak charcoal instead of briquettes. I think everyone left the table full and happy. Bob, you can come back with your smoker anytime. Thank you for the meal.

Our Iron in the Hat brought FABA \$62.00. We also passed the hat for the coal we use at the meetings and we came up with \$25.00 for the Pioneer Art Settlement project by itself. Once you have your tools in place then it is time to start. I used a piece of 1 3/4" 4140 4" long it gives you a 2Lb hammer head. The first step is to make a strike on the side of the cylinder to make 2 flat sides. Then you find the center and start your punch. It is important to have two, one will get over heated and start to mushroom. Brian also puts a chisel point on one of his drifts (Mark Aspery uses a bull pin for his drifts it is a good option) as well and keep changing out after each punch. Once you have gone all the way through now it is time to drift the eye some, not all the way. This is when you use the cupping tool to make the rounded face and the flattener on the other face to shape your hammer faces. At this time you use the top and bottom fullers to spread out your cheeks. Heating as you go keep your steel hot. The Bolsters are to help you put the drift back in the eye with out damaging the cheeks. It is time to separate the faces of the hammer from the eye area using the 1/2" bottom and top fuller. Each time you reset the drift, you will drive it in a little more until the eye is the size you want - always drive the drift into the smaller hole making it the larger hole. When you have reached the shape you want your hammer to be let the hammer head cool slowly file and buff the faces. Heat the hammer head up to non-magnetic quench in clean vegetable oil and let cool. Now heat your drifts and place them one at a time in the eye of the hammer until the you start to see a gold change on the face of the hammer and quench again. Now it is ready for a handle and to be put to work. Happy hammering! Brian is a very knowledgeable Blacksmith and for those who got to meet him it is a changing experience.

Report from the Northwest by John Boy Watson & Billy Christie

The NW held its meeting on May 14, at Jim (Preacher) & Nita Labolito's Fern Forge, in Tallahassee. The day began cloudy and then the bottom fell out; but, being the die hards or hard heads that we are, we just went with the flow.

The three demonstrators were Jim Croft, Rob Nichols and Brad Pafford. Jim was the lead and he demonstrated accurately drifting a hole and how to make it line up with another piece of iron. Jim stressed that the mark can grow and sometimes you may have to make a test piece to get it right. Rob Nichols worked on repairing part of his grill and it worked out great. Now he won't have to buy a new grill.

Lunch, as always, was delicious with John Boy working his magic on the BIG custom smoker. With the rain, John was having a hard time keeping the heat going for his specialty, the melt in your mouth brisket. Even though there was rain, thunder, and lightning, he still worked his magic and everything turned out perfectly! The grilled vegetables, corn, potato salads, and desserts were absolutely scrumptious. No one left hungry!

The "Iron in the Hat" had a number of hand forged items along with other interesting items. We raised \$118.00 and thanks to Lloyd Wheeler and Dot Butler for their help with the drawings. We were also joined by Jerry Wolf, President who was on his way to the Southeastern Blacksmith Meeting that was being held in Madison, Georgia. We were glad to see all the FABA members that were able to make the conference.

In conclusion, we thank Jim, his wife Nina, and church family for the warm welcome at his forge and the fine food that was served. We also want to thank Jim, Brad, and Rob for their efforts at the forge, John Boy for his cooking, and all of those who were in attendance for this fun filled, educational meeting. REGIONAL REPORTS CONTINUED

SW Region – May 28th Meeting at Wolfe Forge

Trez Cole gave an extensive evaluation report concerning - Hammers – Myth or Legend. Trez reviewed the various styles of hammers from the traditional blacksmith cross peen to Japanese style, HOFI style and many others. Some have specific purposes and benefits. The “FORCE” to move metal is dependent upon the weight and velocity of the hammer and Trez demonstrated if you use a VERY LARGE hammer, you can do a LOT OF METAL MOVEMENT. (a little exaggeration but the theory is true) The handle material is also very important in relation to vibration conductivity. A fiberglass handle is best to minimize the low frequency vibration that can cause damage to the wrist and arm. Trez gave us an extensive discussion concerning Ergonomics. How you hold the hammer, how you stand, how you swing; all are important to get the job done with minimal affect on your body and muscles. The whole demo was enjoyed by our “crowd of 15”.

SW Region Report by Lisa Anne Conner

RINGING ENDORSEMENTS

My grandfather William Siebler Received this 1919 from the Young Men’s Christian Association (YMCA) of Aurora, Nebraska. He was a blacksmith from the old country, and the letter was an invitation to conduct an anvil salute.

In that era, it was a custom on the Forth of July for a blacksmith to fire off a salute in honor of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Black powder was placed between two anvils, one of which flew off when the powder was lighted. This was done for many years, and I would think it is still performed in some locations. You can be assured that it made a loud, ringing noise. The letter follows:

“Dear Sir. By authority of action of the Committee I am instructed to extend to you an invitation to give 48 anvil salutes, one for each state, at six o’clock in the morning of the coming 4th of July.

It is a matter of history that on that great immortal day, that your craft fired anvils to let the people know that the Declaration of Independence had been adopted. It seems most fitting that you should officiate not only because of your craft, but for a greater reason, although born a German you became a true loyal citizen of America....

For safety first, leave the rings off of the anvil. Present the bill to me for the powder. A little attention to the 37th salute, for that is Nebraska’s star on Old Glory” – James Koopman
